English

Reading - Key texts: "The Pirate Next Door (narrative) The Owl and the Pussycat/ The Owl and the Astronaut (poems), The Little Boat, Where the wild thinas are"

Developing pleasure and motivation to read. Comprehension skills focusing on Y2 key skills/content domains both during whole class reading and guided group reading.

Speaking and Listening - Performance of their poems and their sea shanty sonas.

Writing Composition - Writing for different purposes, developing stamina, editing and checking work throughout.

Narrative: Use "The Pirates Next Door" to write their own story about pirates moving into the local area / Using The Little Boat, and Where the Wild Thinas Area write their own journey story to a different land.

Poetry: looking at the rhyme and word pattern in "The Owl and the Pussycat", write their own journey poem.

Nonfiction: Write a non-fiction booklet about pirates.

Spelling: Weekly spellings linked to National Curriculum spellings for Year 2. Main focus: adding suffix -ment, -less, -ful, -ly, -ness Grammar: Linked to the National Curriculum requirements for Year 2. Main focus: identify word classes, verbs and tenses, vocabulary. Handwriting: Children join and enhance the fluency and neatness of their writing. Emphasis on neat presentation and pride in all written work.

Art

Develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space.

- Create a seascape painting.
