News from the Desk of the Deputy Head

It's been a foggy, cold and icy week but the evenings are definitely starting to get lighter and the Snowdrops have finally made an appearance. I spoke to the children in assembly last week about the Snowdrop, otherwise known as the 'flower of hope'. We likened this to new beginnings and positivity and the children were interested to find out that being positive, hopeful and kind has actually been scientifically proven to help us live longer! In assembly this week, we have thought about how we can each achieve success and the children worked collaboratively to complete a challenge involving a stick and a unicorn! The children have been sharing ideas about how they can be successful in different situations and what success means to different people. Each day at school, I see so many children working as part of a team, taking safe risks, showing perseverance, asking questions, communicating with others and being confident and proud of themselves and these are all keys to success.

The cold weather hasn't hindered Reception children this week as they ventured over to the paddock for their weekly forest school lesson. It's so lovely to see the children wrapped up in their water proofs and wellies - the weather certainly doesn't deter them one bit! I have also seen some rather fabulous tissue paper portraits appearing around the class of a very famous playwright. We spend lots of time talking to the children about their work each day, asking questions and always encouraging them to recall knowledge and skills from previous learning. Thea wowed Mrs Buchanan when she said she knew that William Shakespeare was a famous writer and he died on his birthday! Well done Thea. Year 1 have been exploring different animals from the polarregions this week. They have used IPads to research lots of questions about penguins and are writing some super information fact-files, using the conjunction 'and' to make compound sentences. What a clever lot!


In Year 2, the children are well and truly gripped with their class text A Midsummer Night's Dream and have made some impressive predictions about the story and the characters. They have also had their first exploration of Old Town in our Topic lessons, they looked at terraced houses and explored maps of the town and the school, giving directions using the four compass points. They have also designed their own computer game, recreating the forest from A Midsummer Night's Dream and have written instructions for how to play the game. Year 3 and 4 have been equally busy this week rehearsing and preparing their collaborative amateur dramatics performance with Mr Scarlett, Mr Moss and Miss McDermott. I'm not allowed to give anything away, by orders of Mr Scarlett, but, like a true journalist, I asked for just a snippet of information to keep me content - he said there will definitely be a lot of sport and musical delights! Watch this space. I have had a few visitors from Year 5 pupils this week, armed with their English books. I always love looking through English books and seeing the progression from the start of the year. I was really wowed by what I read - the sophistication and quality of vocabulary in their writing was impressive as they gave quite complex instructions for someone to find their way around a map. The children are once again enthralled with their class text and their enthusiasm comes across so evidently in their written work. Year 6 have been getting very scientific, exploring icebergs this week. I have seen Mrs Euinton busily making icebergs in the staffroom for different investigations in the classroom and the children have had a super time exploring how icebergs are formed and making information fact-file posters all about icebergs. They were able to answer lots of my questions and show an excellent understanding of their learning experiences.
