

## Literacy

Show an interest in illustrations in books and print in books and the environment – recognise own name.  
Handle books carefully and know that print carries meaning.  
Continue a rhyming string.  
Hear and say initial sounds.  
Link graphemes to phonemes.  
Give meaning to marks as they draw and paint.  
Ascribe meaning to marks they see in different places.

Funnybones (Ahlbergs)	Recognising rhyme, repeating words, cvc words. Initial sounds.	Rhyming strings, marks/labels for pictures. Sequencing.
The name jar.(Yangsook Choi)	Looking at illustrations, giving them meaning. Recognising friend's names/classroom labels.	Writing own name, copying labels using items in the story.

## Understanding the World

Talk about past and present events in their own lives and the lives of family members.  
Talk about similarities and differences among families, communities and traditions.  
Talk about the features of their own immediate environment and how environments might vary from one another.  
Show skill in making toys work by pressing parts or lifting flaps to achieve movement, sound or new images.

## Maths

Play with shapes, use them appropriately for tasks and talk about them – eg; round, tall.  
Select and name 2D shapes.  
Create and recreate patterns.  
Recite numbers 1-10 in order.  
Compare two groups of objects.  
Show an interest in number problems.  
Show an interest in representing numbers

## Expressive arts and design

Use various construction materials.  
Sing familiar songs.  
Explore colours and how they can be changed.  
Use simple tools effectively.  
Engage in imaginative role play.  
Create simple representations of people, events and objects.

Choosing activities and resources with help.  
Talk to new people and children they are playing with.  
Talk about themselves and home.
