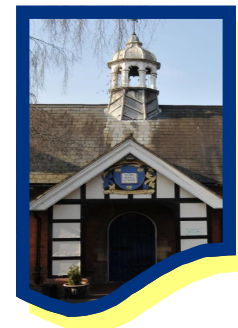


Stratford-upon-Avon Primary 'News'

News from the Desk of the Executive Head

I love walking round our school and seeing all the amazing things going on. It is certainly a hive of activity.

Some of our keyworker children have been super busy creating 3D models of London landmarks. These are looking very impressive and certainly recognisable. I am told that we can expect a working model of Tower Bridge. Their classroom looks incredible too with a mural from the story. Whilst down in Year One they have been writing about the story of The Colour Monster. The presentation is excellent and you can really see how much their vocabulary has progressed. The children are really proud of their achievements. In Reception they have been following the story of Owl Babies and have learnt the skill of pom-pom making to create their own miniature owls. Mrs Wilson had one on her desk, it is super cute. Mrs Buchanan has also been showing the children how to paint an owl with different paint techniques. Top Tips for Home Learning - Year 4

- You get good at something by practicing it regularly. Whether that's your times tables, riding a bike, baking a cake or writing a story.
- You get good by repeating repeating, repeating!
- Feelings of frustration are a normal part of learning - don't be afraid of those feelings. If you are trying to do something new or practicing something you find tricky you may feel frustrated. That's good, you are on the edge of new learning! Don't give up. Acknowledge those feelings and persevere.
- Why not let your children be teachers? Have them plan a lesson for you and teach you something they have learned recently.

In Biology, Year 6 are exploring how living things can be classified into groups according to their different features. In their first lesson, working as taxonomists, the children devised a branching classification key to sort themselves based on their physical attributes, using 'yes' and 'no' type questions.
