Religious Education

Engaging pupils in enquiry into significant human questions which religion and worldviews address, so that they can develop the understanding and skills needed to appreciate and appraise varied responses to these questions, as well as develop responses of their own.

E-Safety


Children will use technology to find.

Maths

Shape Recognise and name 2D shapes e.g. squares, rectangles and circles. Recognise and name 3D shapes e.g. cuboids, pyramids and spheres. Sorting 2D and 3D shapes and creating patterns using shapes.

Place Value within 20

Count to 20 forwards and backwards, beginning with 0 or 1 from any given number.
