Today we have been thinking about children who are not as fortunate as we are. We wore our spotty clothes for Children in Need, whilst raising money for the important cause. Thank you for 🔸 your support.

This week I have been visiting all the classes and speaking with the children about what they have been learning in their classrooms. It is one of my favourite things to do as the children here are always so engaging and keen to share their experiences and learning with me.

Reception have continued learning about Diwali and throughout the week have been making clay divas ready to decorate along with their parents during the topic sharing that happened today. It was wonderful to see the enjoyment in the room for this activity. When they take them home with a tea light, they should be able to tell their families about the festival of light. Year 1 are continuing with their 'Blue Penguin' book and using the text to further their understanding of seasons, particularly winter. Year 4's learning was also linked with this colder season; the children were able to explain to me the similarities and differences between a Victorian Christmas and a Christmas today. The Wild West is the focus in Year 3, linked with their class text 'Hideout Kids'. This is a newer theme for them, but they are very much engaged and keen to find out more as the book and topic progresses. Both Year 2 and Year 6 were focused and challenged in their maths when I visited their classrooms. Year 2 were attempting to add up and compare different amounts of money, and Year 6 were working on strategies to help with short division. The prospective parents I was showing round were hugely impressed (and somewhat daunted!) by the level of expectation in the maths at that end of the school. Year 5 went on a visit to the Heart of England on Wednesday, staying late into the evening to do stargazing and planet finding. Naomi told me how much she enjoyed the trip, even though the class (and their teachers) are all pretty tired afterwards!

Singing assembly with KS1 was a particular highlight for me this week. Being able to play the grand piano again and hearing the lovely voices was a delight, especially Year 2 singing 'Away in a Manger' so confidently!


