

***** **Top Tips for Reception - from Mrs Slater**

 \star Get the children involved in what they are doing – visual ☆ timetables are brilliant and are simple to do. Use pictures and key words - the children can even draw and write their \bigstar own, post-it's work well for this, as do photos. There are lots \bigstar of examples on Pinterest, Twinkl and TES websites. \bigstar Message me if you need some help setting this up. \bigstar

☆ Do not expect your Reception children to concentrate on ☆ directed learning for a long period of time! Anything where they need to focus on listening, reading or writing should be \bigstar kept short - roughly 20 minutes as a maximum. They can \bigstar then go and practice - playing schools with toys or teaching \bigstar a sibling/parent works really well and is fun to watch! \bigstar

 \star Keep it practical – a child that is 'doing' is a child that is ☆ learning. I have deliberately designed the tasks on eSchools to follow this principle. Please message me for help and \bigstar support if you need it, I am more than happy to help. \bigstar

 \star Photos and videos are really valuable for an indication of \star what the children are doing. We use them a lot in their ☆ Learning Journeys at school and they are a good tool for a ☆ child to be able to reflect on their own learning. They also \star provide lovely memories for later on.

 \bigstar Have fun with your children, stay calm and be kind to ☆ yourself. These are unprecedented times for us all and we ☆ are in this together. Please keep in touch, ask for support if ☆ you need it and I am looking forward to seeing you all at the ☆ end of this journey! You are doing a great job so far, thank 🛧 you.



Top tips for ... Practicing mindfulness!

Mindfulness to try at home:

- It can be so easy to take notice of our negative thoughts that we miss taking notice of the present and the good things. Mindfulness means giving attention to our environment and ourselves. It helps you focus on the present and see what is beautiful and unusual in the world. It is being aware of your thoughts and feelings as they arise, without ever getting lost in them.
- While eating, pay attention to your senses: the smell, taste and how it feels
- Try a walk or run without a phone N or music and take notice of your surroundings.
