News from the Desk of the Deputy Head

Considering we are now into June, it's been a rather chilly week and I have even had to dig out my scarf to wear for gate duty each day! Morning drop offs and collections are now a slick operation and the children that have returned to school in Reception, Year 1, Year 6 and our Key Worker bubbles have quickly adapted to the new routines and procedures. Social distancing and hand washing are very much a key part of their school day now but it hasn't fazed them one bit and they continue to show immense strength and resilience.

We have now come to the end of the second week since reopening and the buzz in school has been fantastic. As well as the children adapting, our curriculum has adapted too. I have visited (from a distance) all the classrooms this week and seen and heard such enthusiasm from both the children and the staff! I have heard many intriguing conversations coming from Year 6 about their class text Holes - there has been a lot of deliberation and inferences made and you can hear a pin drop when Mrs McCormack and Mrs Ingate are reading to the class. Mr Scarlett and Mrs Beesley have moved out of sketch books and taken to the classroom walls in their art lessons! They have completely covered one of the walls in a spectacular city scape/ Gangsta Granny mural. The children have loved being able to paint their classroom and bring their learning to life. The two Reception bubbles this week have been having a great time exploring the garden area. They have been excited to learn about different habitats and I couldn't believe my eyes when Paolo showed me a beetle that he had discovered. It was enormous! He very carefully showed me how to put it under a magnifying glass (although it was that big I'm not sure he needed one) and we studied its delicate features. The children are loving their outdoor learning experiences in their bubbles and it was a welcome relief to have access to the paddock again. As you can imagine, the grass has had lots of glorious sunshine, with many weeks to grow, and the children have thoroughly enjoyed spending lots of the week playing, exploring and learning in this amazing space. The Key Worker bubbles have been learning new non-contact PE games and have made Ichibana using leaves, fir cones, twigs, flowers and grass that they collected. As well as outdoor learning being high on the agenda, so is making sure that the children and staff have had time to talk and reconnect with one another. In the Year 1 bubbles, the children have been reading The Colour Monster. The children have been exploring different feelings and thinking about what colours these could relate to. Their writing and art work is impressive and I have seen some very angry, happy and sad monsters in the classrooms. What I have also noticed is that the children are enjoying being able to talk about how they are feeling and know that it is okay to feel confused, worried and angry. Amongst everything going on at school, the children who cannot be with us just yet are very much in our thoughts every day. This week, the teachers and teaching assistants have managed to contact or leave messages to check in and make sure everyone is still smiling, getting on okay with their home learning and to organise Teams meetings. It is so lovely to receive your messages and see photos of the children's home learning experiences so please keep sending them in. You're all doing a really fantastic job.
