News from the Desk of the Executive Head



This week in November is always a time in our country for everyone to come together in remembrance. It is a time for us all to reflect and say thank you to those who have sacrificed their lives in wars and conflicts. On Wednesday Stratford Primary came together with Heathcote Primary through Microsoft Teams for a joint assembly. Mrs Withers led this assembly and taught the children the value of saying thank you and also

Respect. The children learnt that across our country in villages, towns and cities there are different places where people can reflect and remember in peaceful surroundings. Together we all stood in silence across the two schools and remembered those who have given their lives for others and still do. It was a wonderful moment for the children to see each other and understand how important it is to never forget. I spoke to the children about looking into their family history and how every family at some point will have been touched by war and how we should learn and come together in peace and understanding. I shared my own experience; my husband served for 25 years in the armed forces and was proud to do so, my great uncle served in WW2 and 2 of my great grandfathers served in WW1. One grandfather was injured in the battle of The Somme. No matter what our backgrounds, thoughts, concerns it is always important to recognise we are one society who have the power to respect each other, learn from each other and care for each other. We unite together.

Both schools have created poppy trails and the children have had the opportunity throughout the week to learn the meaning of the poppy, to explore poetry written in WW1, to reflect on how it must have felt to see the poppies grow on the battlefields. They have used different art skills to create their poppies; felt making, pastels, pointillism, sculpture, painting. They stop and look at the poppies created and talk about the meaning behind them. The children have made poppies to display in Debenhams window in the town as part of a whole community project. The trail is beautiful and we have photos in our newsletter this week to share with you.

At Stratford Primary we are very conscious of our history and particularly in year 6 where they begin to learn about the men who died in WW1 who once came to our school and walked the streets surrounding it. They study the census returns and family history sites to find out more about

them. After our assembly Mrs Withers and myself took our 4 new house captains. Charlie, Thomas, Poppy and Maya to the Stratford memorial gardens to lay a wreath and remember the 28 men who are listed on the memorial. We were very proud of our house captains as they respectfully stood in silence and then read out the names of the men. We will always remember them in our school



We made our own felt poppies from Merino wool. We layered red wool strands in a circular pattern, overlapping in the centre. Then, we added some thin strands of other colours: darker red, purple or pinks. In the middle, we added some black to create the centre of the poppy. The wool was soaked with warm soapy water and then it was rolling time! We folded over our bubble wrap and rolled in every direction many, many times, until the fibres had started to interlock. Then we could tuck in the edges to form our petal shapes and turn it over to ... yes, you've guessed it - roll some more. Finally, our poppies were rinsed in warm water and left to dry. We are all very pleased with the fantastic results!
