English <u>Reading</u> - Key text The Demon Dentist by David Walliams

Developing pleasure and motivation to read. Comprehension skills focusing on Y4 key skills/content domains in whole class reading, group reading and one to one reading sessions

<u>Speaking and Listening</u> – Take part in presentations or present different views on different questions or issues

<u>Writing Composition</u> – Writing for different purposes, developing stamina, editing and checking work throughout.

Nonfiction: Creating an explanation text about teeth and how to prevent decay by using technical language, writing in the present tense and using cause and effect connectives

# **Religious Education**

(According to Warwickshire and Coventry agreed syllabus for RE 2017) Engaging pupils in enquiry into significant human questions which religion and worldviews address, so that they can develop the understanding and skills needed to appreciate and appraise varied responses to these questions, as well as develop responses of their own.

This term we will be learning about Hinduism, thinking about what it means to be Hindu in Britain today and learning about the festival of Diwali
